The problem with trying to imbue this play with the aura of tragedy is not that Willy Loman is a little man, it's that he's not a good man : he's not much of a salesman; he cheats on his wife; he lives vicariously and unfairly through his eldest son, Buck, then makes excuses for that son's pathological misbehavior; he virtually ignores his second son; he's a real bastard to friends, neighbors and extended family; and so on. She begins to sob, repeating "We're free. We are to be moved not by the man's personality but by his condition. The wonder is that he has hung on so long. The salesman part is what he does to stay alive. The young Biff enters, and Willy praises Biff's prospects and the fact that he is well liked. It was said that "it was impossible to get the audience to leave the theatre"[by whom? There is a lot of exposition, but no call to the barricades. Willy Lo. But he could be a peasant, he could be, whatever. It was an instant success and it also won Arthur Miller a place among one of the best American playwrights of the 20th century. Both leave, and though the daydream ends, Willy continues to mutter to himself. Letta: Miss Forsythe's friend. It was a satirical attack on the Great American Dream of prosperity and material wealth and had also challenged the ideals of the past years that constituted such dreams. Willy tries to broach the subject of working in New York, but Howard interrupts him and makes him listen to his kids and wife on the wire recorder. His name was never in the paper. Dustin Hoffman played Willy. Willy accidentally calls Charley Ben. Then we were on our way to prosperity; now we are in the grip of a recession which gives little sign of soon receding. Toward that end, he is all back-slapping, forced humor, pretense, and bluster and he demands the same of his poor benighted sons. In Willy's flashbacks, he is a nerd, and Willy forces him to give Biff test answers. He is dead, but Willy frequently speaks to him in his hallucinations of the past. Unlike the Whytes and Riesmans, Arthur Miller had no interest in Bernard, no interest in the phenomenon of success. Howard leaves and Willy gets angry. The problem with this is that, much like Jay Gatsby see Orrin's review , Willy has simply failed to understand the promise of that dream. Charley offers Willy a job, but Willy, insulted, refuses it.
